President's Letter 2025

Progress has been slow, but the Friends are moving closer to our goal of acquiring title to Church property since Delaware Township offered to sell it to us for \$1.00 last year! FLSC, Inc. responded to the verbal offer in writing on February 5, 2025 and again through our attorney on May 20, 2025. Correspondence continued between the attorneys throughout the summer. On October 23, 2025, the Township Committee

produced a letter of support, voicing their endorsement of FLSC, Inc. ownership, and their commitment to achieving a timely and smooth transition. The Friends hope to take title early in 2026.

With ownership comes responsibility, but since incorporation in 1987, we are familiar with this burden. Since 1989, the Township had a benign influence, but one that was devoid of any financial contributions. In early 2025, a generous patron pledged to pay for our capped legal fees for the transfer. Ownership of the church property will not change the mission of the Friends, nor the obligation for public access for Green Acres use or other Special Conditions recorded with the Deed in 1989.

What changes are an increase in paperwork needed to maintain tax-free real estate ownership and some increased overhead costs. The New Jersey Conservation Foundation has offered to assist us in understanding and preparing the necessary documents. FLSC, Inc. will be responsible for all insurance premiums, as we have been during Township ownership.

The property transfer removes a roadblock to the Wagon Shed Project. It will release us from the NJ Prevailing Wage Rules, which stem from Township ownership. The Friends will be able to invite bids and select contractors without the burden of state rules designed for government-owned properties. The Township had informed us that they were occupied with Dilts Park redevelopment and could not help with the Wagon Shed Project. Therefore, the only way to proceed is for FLSC, Inc. to own the property.

FLSC, Inc. is \$50,000 short of funds needed to cover the projected cost of construction of the Wagon Shed Project. We have raised \$83,165 from patrons and secured a \$143,000 grant from the State Historic Preservation Office. Recently, \$15,378 was returned to FLSC, Inc., reimbursement for funds expended in accordance with the grant. However, we have spent \$58,000 on design drawings, engineering and government permits so far. An additional \$10,244 has been spent on legal fees, primarily for the unanticipated Board of Adjustment Use Variance. The Friends have \$30,128 in funds that are dedicated to the Wagon Shed Project. Now more than any recent appeal, FLSC, Inc. needs your contribution. Our organization has been kept solvent by a core group of patrons, punctuated with widely-spaced much larger donations. Between the two, we are able to maintain the building.

During the past two years the Trustees have increased public outreach in an effort to build a larger patron base. Some first-time attendees to the StoneHouse Concerts were clearly impressed with building appearance and the acoustics. Some have expressed interest in working as a volunteer, an advisor, or a Trustee. Our plans for 2026 are focused on growing our programing, expanding our patron base and moving the Wagon Shed Project forward. To do this, the Friends need your monetary support. Treasurer's Report

Tor the year 2025 to November 1, we have **⊥** 'had income of \$28,781.13 and expenses of \$22,641.97 for a net income of \$6,139.16. We received our first reimbursement from the New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund for 57% of the eligible funds we spent since August 2023. That \$15,378.32 helped us improve for the year so far, to better performance than the past few years when Wagon Shed expenses were high. Individual contributions have been over \$1,350 so far with your normal year end contributions still to come. We were fortunate to raise \$2,900 in support of the StoneHouse summer and Mimi Conklin Upmeyer fall concerts. We have continued to benefit from moderate interest rates on Treasury Bills, a super safe investment. With lower interest rates income was down from last year to \$1,998.

Our biggest source of income has been the enthusiastic support for our concerts. If you were lucky enough to attend you experienced a wide

variety of musical genres and enthusiastic audience participation. This year we have experienced the largest attendance of any programs we have ever had. The historic building can really showcase its marvelous acoustics.

We continue to see a very high use of PayPal to purchase concert tickets at a discount over the at the door admission fee. Using PayPal lets us have additional email addresses so many new concert attendees are receiving this newsletter for the first time. We are still printing and mailing a limited number of newsletters to supporters and friends but email helps us preserve our limited resources.

Building maintenance this year turned from tree work to the building itself. We retained several skilled local craftsmen to restore windows, interior wall plaster and paint. Repair to a stone wall displaced by growing tree roots is planned as well. We are also working to keep squirrels from visiting via the open flue of the chimney.

Concert performers have been very generous with their talents charging well below their usual engagement fees to entertain you. Our concert managers work hard to make your enjoyment as economical as possible.

Your support is needed for the annual fund. It provides the resources to maintain the building and grounds. Most of the work is accomplished by volunteers. Our next door neighbor is still cutting the grass and the trustees clean the building in preparation for events and perform some building maintenance. We do need paid services for preparing our tax return, maintaining our website and publishing our newsletter.

We recognize with gratitude your trust in our stewardship of the site and the resources that you contribute.

THE MIMI CONKLIN UPMEYER FALL CONCERT SERIES 2025

The Mimi Conklin Upmeyer Fall Concert season **▲** opened with The Anderson Brothers Trio's unique tribute to Richard Rodgers, with Will Anderson and Peter Anderson on the saxophone and clarinet, and Adam Moezina on the guitar. In addition to delighting the audience with their unique improvisations, they gave a synopsis of Richard Rodgers' biography and historical anecdotes of the pieces themselves. Peter spoke of the collaboration between Rodgers and Lorenz Hart and Oscar Hammerstein. The trio's individual improvisations flowed from one to the other so smoothly underscoring their cohesiveness, which was noticed by audience members during the ensuing post-concert comments from the audience. This was the trio's second performance at the Locktown Stone Church.

The following week, the Andorinha Duo, featuring Hunterdon County native Robin Zeh on the violin and her husband, Paul Woodiel on the nyckelharpa and fiddle, performed early music from Scandinavia, with pieces from Medieval



and Renaissance scores. They explained the influence of these early works on future musical styles. The duo also included traditional airs and joyful polskas from the Swedish repertoire. Their performance at the Locktown Stone Church marked their premiere

public performance of such a program. Robin expressed further delight in having her 2nd grade teacher and early violin teacher, as well as family, in the audience. They commented that the acoustics of the church was perfect for their program, and they expressed a genuine interest in returning.

After a one-week break, we closed our Fall 2025 Season with the string trio Filament, featuring Evan Few, violin, Elena Kaufman, viola da gamba, and John Walthausen, harpsichord. They presented a program called Bach Revisited, in which they played works by J.S. Bach, sonatas written for the organ. The Ensemble transcribed the pieces for viola da gamba, violin, and harpsichord. At the end of the concert, Elena demonstrated the treble and bass viola da gamba to interested audience members.

"A JOB WELL DONE!"



This summer the trustees committed \$10,000 to make several repairs to include exterior and interior work. Brian Cahill of CDMA, Inc. in Rosemont took care of painting all the windows and doors, glazing windows where needed and repairing a broken window pane. Brian inspected all the exterior soffits, fascias and moldings and determined only one small area needing to be addressed. The shutters also received his attention. Inside the church Brian repaired the worst of the plaster failure below the chair rail, where moisture has taken its toll.

It is a pleasure to enter this pristine structure on a bright fall afternoon, to take in the clear sunlight reflected on the white woodwork and enjoy the turning leaves through the old wavy glass of the original windows.
